Shannah Tovah to one and all! May this New Year of 5769 bring to everyone health and love, community and prosperity. May you all be inscribed in the Book of Life.

During September, Temple Beth Am has planned a wonderful month of Elul learning opportunities. Please note the dates and times; all events will take place at the Temple, at 7:00 PM.

For those of you with a shofar, Dr. Don Gilden, renowned ram's horn virtuoso, will be available to teach the basics in this arcane art on Sunday, September 7th. Thrill to the ancient wail of the shofar, as it calls us to repentance and forgiveness. Those who complete his program may enjoy ascending the Bimah at the conclusion of Yom Kippur, as we end our service with the multi-toned blasts of many shofars. Note as well, that our Sisterhood Gift Shop has an excellent selection of beautiful shofars for sale!

On successive Thursdays at 7:00 PM, September 11th, 18th, and 25th, three more pre-Rosh Hashanah programs will take place. Each will center around major prayers and themes of the High Holy Days.

September 11th: A discussion on Sin and the Unetanah Tokef prayer ("On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed: How many will pass on....," etc.) and perhaps Al Cheit ("For the sin which we have sinned before You...").

September 18th: As this precedes the Service of S'lichot on Saturday evening, September 20th (among the most beautiful worship opportunities in the entire year!), we will examine the concept of Forgiveness and the S'lichot Service.

September 25th: To round out our brief examination of prayers and themes, we will look at Kol Nidrei and possibly Aveinu Malkeinu.

Elsewhere, please note our incredible Continuing Education Program for the Fall, beginning on successive Thursday evenings from October 23rd through December 18th (except November 27th, due to Thanksgiving, of course). Classes from "Beginning Hebrew" to "Interfaith Grandparent Discussion" to "Getting More out of Being Jewish" and much more will be offered. Mark off Thursday nights for Jewish learning at Temple.

Let this New Year of 5769 be a year of wisdom!



More Thoughts on the Akeidah

In last month's Temple Topics article, I focused on the teachings gleaned from the "awakening" of Isaac in the *Akeidah* (the almost-sacrifice of Isaac). This month, the focus is on Abraham and his understanding, or misunderstanding of God's command.



Or, more profoundly, as Maggid Andy Gold suggests, is Abraham being asked not to lift up Isaac, but to elevate himself? Perhaps "the one you love" referred to in the text is really the beloved part of ourselves, the part we protect so vehemently. And what is the part of ourselves that we protect the most? The wounded parts, the parts that live in the illusion of separateness. Our higher self, *neshama*, understands that we are all one, all part of the great



Divine whole (as we assert in the *Sh'ma*). Our lower self, our ego self, *nefesh*, lives in the illusion of separation, which is a place of great fear. So perhaps, Abraham is being asked to "sacrifice" his death grip on illusion (which the *nefesh* considers reality), and to truly embrace the essence of the *Sh'ma*, the oneness of the uni-

verse. But Abraham doesn't get it! He is a fundamentalist – he takes God's instruction literally. It is only at the last possible moment that an angel stays Abraham's hand. Who or what is that angel? Perhaps it is Abraham's *neshama*, his higher in-dwelling God consciousness, his healthy connected self, that overrides the control of his *nefesh*, his fearful separated self. In that moment, Abraham gets it. Of course, he has already traumatized his son, but that's a separate issue!

Enlightenment, living in a constant state of awareness of the oneness of the universe, is not a finite endpoint, but a continual series of "awake" moments. May we use the space provided by *Elul* and *Tishrei* (the months before and during the High Holy Days), to begin the work of "sacrificing" our controlling, egodriven *nefesh*, so that we can live more comfortably in the peaceful connection of our *neshama*.

Shana tova u'metukah! May your year be good, sweet, enlightening and fulfilling.

It's Pomegranate Season by Sharon Malek Jacobs, Director of Education

We are all familiar with the Rosh Hashanah custom of dipping apples in honey. Some dip pieces of round challah in honey. Both customs symbolize our desire to be remembered for a sweet and full year.

The pomegranate is another fruit that we can enjoy during the autumn Holiday season. One of the symbolic reasons for this is explained in a midrash that proffers the idea that there are 613 kernels in a pomegranate; the same number of mitzvot the Torah encourages us to fulfill.

When I was in Israel, every gift shop I entered was selling pomegranate art. I asked a clerk why the decorative form of this fruit seemed to be "growing" in every shop. Her explanation was interesting. The pomegranates are created by some well know artists who were drawn to the shape and colors of this unique fruit that is mentioned in Deuteronomy as one of the seven choice fruits of Eretz Yisrael, the Land of Israel. The pomegranate also was one of the fruits that the spies brought to Moses to demonstrate to him the prosperity found in the Promised Land. Apparently, these artists wanted to remind us of the prosperity found in modern Israel. There is another beautiful midrash that compares children studying Torah to the seeds of a pomegranate. Just like pomegranate seeds clump together in rows inside the fruit, children engaged in studying Torah clump together in groups (Shir HaShirim Rabbah 6:11) working on extracting the juiciness of Torah.

As we are about to begin a new year, I look forward to watching our students "clump" together in the pursuit of Torah.

My family and I wish all of you a happy, healthy and sweet New Year. And, perhaps this year, you will add a pomegranate to your Rosh Hashanah table.

In spite of bad weather during our pool party, there was an opportunity for a dip in the pool. It was a wonderful evening.



Family Services

Our Family Services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are led by our Clergy with music by guitarist Andy Symons. These Services are open to the entire Community.

Fasting

Every Jewish person over the age of Bar/Bat Mitzvah is expected to fast on Yom Kippur. Besides the lessons that fasting teaches about self-denial and appreciation of what we are, it provides a physical complement to the emotional and spiritual cleansing of the Day of Atonement. Children should be encouraged to fast if they show an interest in doing so. For a pre-Bar/Bat Mitzvah, the fast may involve skipping a meal during Yom Kippur rather than a full day's fast. Pregnant women and nursing mothers should abstain from fasting as should any person who is ill or who has been advised against fasting by a physician. Let common sense guide you in the fulfillment of this mitzvah.

Child Care Available for High Holy Days

Temple Beth Am provides complimentary childcare for children in third grade and younger during morning services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Children in fourth grade and above are expected to attend services with their parents. Older children should not find it difficult to sit through the entire service. Every parent must be responsible to assure that his/her child does not linger in the foyer, become unruly, or disturb the childcare services.

"Between the Covers with Jewish Authors"
Launches its fourth year on Thursday,

September 18th at 7:30 PM in TBA's Library.

For a lighthearted experience, come hear Marta Braiterman review "The Saturday Wife" (2007), a witty new novel about a rabbinic spouse. The novel is by Naomi Ragen, a bookgroup favorite. In Q&A format, Marta will share personal vignettes while reviewing the fictional story of an upwardly mobile rabbinic wife who moves from the Bronx to suburban Connecticut.

You are welcome to try this group, dedicated to friendly discussion and learning through contemporary Jewish literature. Each month, we use a roundtable book group format to discover personal meaning in Jewish books, sometimes discovering new friends among others who share a love of reading. We rotate book review leadership monthly, signing up as the year begins. Leaders bring their research about the author and pose questions to keep our discussions on topic.

Between the Covers is a dynamic, intergenerational gathering, open to all women, men and mature teens. Sponsored by Sisterhood, this series is free of charge, with monthly attendance around 10-15 people. By individually ordering books from Amazon.com on our Temple website, TBA gets a 5% donation. Monthly reminders of the titles appear in Temple Topics. If you can't finish a book, you are still welcome to come hear the review and discussion.

At the year's opening meeting on September 18th, we will also choose the year's book-picks together, and invite volunteers present to sign up to lead a review. This year's dates will be: 9/18/08, 10/16/08, 11/20/08, 12/20/08, 1/17/09, 2/21/09, 3/19/09 and 5/14/09. Most of these dates are the third Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM, except for the three darkest winter months, where we change to Saturdays at 11:00 AM.

At the September meeting, we'll ask for volunteer reviewers, choosing from among these titles: Away (Amy Bloom); The Septembers of Shiraz (Dalia Sofer); The Sistine Secrets: Michelangelo's Forbidden Images (Blech and Doliner); Miram's Kitchen (Elizabeth Ehrlich); Congregation Contemporary Writers Read the Jewish Bible (David Rosenberg, ed.); A Woman in Jerusalem (A.B. Yehoshua); Stars of David: Prominent Jews Talk About Being Jewish (Abigail Pogrebin); Spicebox of the Earth (poetry by Leonard Cohen); Souls on Fire or A Beggar in Jerusalem (Elie Wiesel); and A Day of Small Beginnings (Lisa Rosenbaum).

So come on Thursday, September 18th at 7:30 PM to hear Marta's review, then help set up our successful fourth year of reading between the covers.
