FROM RABBI LAZARUS-KLEIN

"Hanukkah in Toy Land"



Three decades ago, Toy Story burst into the scene telling the story of a collection of toys led by an iconic cowboy named Woody, and his ragtag team of a slinky dog, a T-rex, Little Bo Peep, and Mr. Potato Head, who must rescue a space ranger named Buzz Lightyear from the clutches of a troubled boy who loves to torture

toys. There are dangerous hijinks including escapes from arcades, jumps onto moving vehicles, and a dramatic rescue through a window.

This Hanukkah in honor of the movie's 30th anniversary, as well as the upcoming release of the 5th installment this coming summer, Congregation Shir Shalom is using this beloved Pixar franchise as our holiday theme. While not intentionally Jewish, Toy Story certainly has a Yiddishe Neshamah, with wonderful teachings on values like Hachnasat Orchim, welcoming guests like Buzz Lightyear, Bikur Cholim, visiting the sick, or in this case broken toys, and in creating a Kehillah Kedoshah, a holy community.

But, given we are bringing this to our synagogue, I started thinking about what it would look like if it were actually Jewish? If it were, what toys and games would be included in the new version of the movie? First on my list would be the dreidel, an oldy but a goody in our annual kids' gift bags. Adding to that, I would include the Purim grogger, a toy Torah, perhaps a Mensch on a Bench, and perhaps a dancing rabbi for good measure.

While I am not sure if Abraham and Sarah ever played with toys, kids' activities have been part of our tradition from our earliest days. Did you think Miriam was playing her timbrel only for an adult audience? In the original Passover Seders, Rabbi Akiva gave out roasted grains and nuts to keep the kids occupied (Pesachim 108b).

Regardless of whether you have ever seen these delightful movies, I encourage you to come out to our Toy Story 8 Friday Night celebration, December 19th, to sing traditional melodies, eat latkes, and to watch Woody and crew put together their very own Menorah.

Mah Koreh B'COL?

(What's Happening at Buffalo Community of Learners)

As we move through this vibrant season of learning and celebration, our B'COL students and families have been joyfully engaged in programs, electives,

and community events.

Recently, parents joined their children in meaningful Family Education programs led by Rabbi Rich and Rabbi Alex. These sessions offered opportunities for shared

learning, thoughtful discussion, and strengthening family connections through Jewish values and tradition. One 6th-grade student shared, "I liked learning with my parents because we talked about things we never really talk about at home."

Our Hanukkah celebrations are being planned by our amazing and creative team of Madrichim—our dedicated high school student leaders. This year's festivities will include hands-on crafts, opportunities for learning, and a meaningful tikkun olam project. As part of this effort, students collected Hanukkah candle boxes and created heartfelt cards to send to Jewish men and women serving in the military around the world. A 7th-grader commented, "It felt good to do something for someone far away who might be celebrating Hanukkah alone." One Madrich added, "We wanted to make sure every soldier knows we are thinking of them and sending light."

We are also pleased to share updates from our Hebrew One-on-One Remote Learning Program. After another cycle of review and evaluation, results continue to demonstrate strong student progress in Hebrew skills. This program supports diverse learning styles and allows us to adapt instruction when remote learning or in-person engagement is more beneficial. A parent recently noted, "My child's confidence in Hebrew reading has grown so much this year." A student shared, "I like learning at my own pace—it helps me feel successful."

As always, we are grateful for our students, families, faculty, teen leaders and Education Committee who bring energy and meaning into our community. We look forward to the weeks ahead as we continue learning, celebrating, and growing together.



LIBRARY CORNER

In 2021, Sarah Hurwitz published Here All Along, the story of her discovery that Judaism had far more depth than the stripped-down version she had imbibed in Hebrew school and from her family's occasional synagogue attendance and had viewed with a certain embarrassment, if not contempt. Her new book, As A Jew: Reclaiming Our Story from Those Who Blame,



Shame, and Try to Erase Us, while addressing the more serious (and sadly, timely) issue of antisemitism, exhibits the same passionate belief that our tradition is worth studying, celebrating, and passing on.

As with Here All Along, As a Jew is informed by Hurwitz's own personal experiences, including her decision to train as a chaplain despite her discomfort with the Christian bias of the program, as well as her realization that she often fell into the trap of internalizing the negative views of Jews and Judaism that still permeate our culture, such as the "vengeful 'Old Testament' God." She follows the history of these views from ancient times through the Middle Ages and the Enlightenment, right up to the present, while also recognizing the positive aspects of these cultures. Interestingly, she traces the demonization of "Zionism" that we see so much of today to the Soviet Union, which helped spread it to an already receptive Arab world. She also provides an understandable and nuanced overview of the actual Zionist movement and the history of Israel.

Throughout, despite confessions of occasional despair and pessimism, Hurwitz maintains a positive outlook, recounts her interactions with thoughtful, engaged Jewish students at the colleges where she has spoken, and encourages all of us to lean in and embrace the beauty and wisdom of Jewish tradition and culture.

ENVIRONMENTAL COLUMN

Extinctions and Climate Change

I have often written about a Goldilocks Earth—where everything is just right. Distance from a right-sized sun. Atmosphere. Temperature. Water. Oxygen. Everything balanced just right. But that balance wasn't always the case. Five times in Earth's history, the planet burped and life was nearly wiped out. Five moments when the balance was violently upset. Sometimes the trigger was dramatic—a cataclysmic volcanic eruption, an asteroid strike, or both. Other times, the cause was slower, more subtle: continents drifting, ice advancing, oceans acidifying, or a flourishing species changing the chemistry of the air.

That's the thing about equilibria—systems in balance. They might seem stable for generations, even eons, and then suddenly the balance is upset. Lots of energy is contained in the Earth's ecosystem. Therefore, it takes something significant to upset it. This is not the case of a straw breaking the camel's back, but of an asteroid smashing it or millions of tons of volcanic ash burying it.

The most famous extinction occurred at the end of the Cretaceous

Period, sixty-five million years ago, when an asteroid the size of Mount Everest slammed into what is now the Yucatán Peninsula. The impact darkened the skies for years, shut down photosynthesis, and ended the reign of the dinosaurs. Yet, from that devastation came a new chapter of life—mammals, and eventually, us.



Today, scientists warn that we are living through a sixth extinction, this time of our own making. The triggers are not from space but from our own hands: carbon emissions, deforestation, habitat destruction, overfishing, and pollution. We have become the asteroid. The changes are rapid, measurable, and accelerating.

And yet, unlike the dinosaurs, we can see it happening. We have knowledge, tools, and moral awareness that no previous species ever possessed. Our tradition teaches Bal Tashchit—"do not destroy." It reminds us that creation is not ours to waste. The concept of Tikkun Olam, repairing the world, extends beyond human society to the web of life itself.

Some say that after God destroyed the world in the flood, God promised never to do so again. And perhaps God has kept that promise. God isn't destroying the world—we are. Our actions, our everyday choices, and our willingness to look away while others, for their own gain, call climate change a hoax or deny scientific truth, make us complicit. Our acquiescence is as dangerous as their denial.

If Earth truly is a Goldilocks planet, then it is also a fragile one—balanced not just by physics and chemistry but by the choices of its most powerful species. The question is whether we can learn from the last five mass extinctions before we make ourselves part of the next.
